Right Whales Spotted Along Our Coast

JACKSONVILLE BEACH, Fla. – Christmas Eve crowds on Jacksonville Beach got a special treat. They saw a mother right whale and her calf swim nearby. Sky 4 also spotted the pair and captured it on video (link below). This happened one week after a whale called Snow Cone and her calf were spotted off the coast of Ponte Vedra Beach. Snow Cone has been entangled in a rope, but Florida Fish and Wildlife experts said Snow Cone is not in danger. We told you how a kayaker tried to remove the rope, but the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission warned against it. FWC urges everyone to avoid getting too close to a whale. Two new mothers - #7 and #8! Eight North Atlantic right whale mother-calf pairs have been sighted this winter in the... Posted by FWC Fish and Wildlife Research Institute on Monday, December 20, 2021. FWC reports eight different North Atlantic right whale mother-calf pairs off our coast. Populations have fallen and the North Atlantic right whale is endangered with fewer than 350 remaining, according to National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

A Mammoth Discovery – Literally!

In May 2021, two scuba divers made a gigantic discovery of prehistoric proportions. In Florida's Peace River, embedded in the sand, they found a four-foot, 50-pound mammoth leg bone. The once-in-a-lifetime discovery could date back as far as the Ice Age.

I was fortunate enough to find two amazing once in a lifetime fossils yesterday. This is the first, come back tomorrow to see the rarest fossil you can find in Florida. Pictured here is a Colombian Mammoth leg bone, and while not as rare as the other thing, it is still an incredible find. Amazingly, it is almost completely undamaged and very well mineralized. Huge shoutout to @derekthediscoverer for helping me unearth this beast. #florida #fossils #ancient #iceage #mammoth ...

Found by Florida scuba divers Derek Demeter and Henry Sadler, the bone was well mineralized and almost completely undamaged. As it turns out, it came from a Columbian mammoth. This type of mammoth was the largest of its kind. Paleontologists estimate that the animals stood 14-feet tall and weighed "about five cars stacked on top of each other," NDTV reported. Also, their tusks reached wider than two bicycles laid end-to-end, the report continued. Mammoths, the ancestors of modern-day elephants, went extinct about 11,000 years ago.

Dive Reports

Report from Kim Walther & Bill Davis:

Open Waters Beach Front Resort and Club, Riviera Beach (It's actually ICW-front) (Check out their website) https://www.openwatersresort.com/

We found just north of the Blue Heron Bridge a spot that caters to divers. The rooms are mostly updated, they have mini split ac (quiet) and a pool. We toured three or four rooms, the manager Darryl was very helpful. They have lots of outdoor areas, and dive gear wash station. Their waterfront area still has a deal of maintenance and work to be done.

When you look at the photo of the mariner at the wheel at Phil Foster Park, you can see the dive flag across the channel. Since you are on the East of the channel and North, you'd swim against the incoming tide to reach the bridge, and against it to return. However, this location is almost right under the bridge, so not too bad.

We did find that staying at the Airbnb South of the bridge allowed us to drift dive North up to the bridge, and there are a lot of pilings and things to see on the way to the bridge, then the ability to drift dive back South to the Airbnb.

This location would provide the opposite situation. Also, if you wanted to dive the snorkel trail, you'd have to consider how rapidly the outgoing tide will be through this narrow cut. Maybe stage a car over at the park before you get in the water, and plan to return by car. It seems people are in the water earlier and later than the high tide over at the snorkel trail due to the

coverage from the island that somewhat blocks the current. This location was about 30% less expensive than where we stayed, with quieter ac, but less dive time possible on each dive.
